## How to Use and Modify the Restaurant Grease Information Sheet PDF File

Since many of BAPPGs members are smaller jurisdictions with limited staff and budget, this information sheet was designed to print out clearly on a 300 DPI printer. There is a space on the front in the lower left-hand corner to type in contact information, creating a master for inexpensive photocopy reproduction.

If your agency plans to modify the sheet before using it, open the PDF using Adobe Acrobat (the program, not just the reader) or Photoshop (at least version 4). The PDF must be "rasterized" (changed from vectored to bitmap format). If you don't have someone in-house that can do that, check with your local Kinko's. I actually checked with one and they thought they'd be able to handle it. Then you can make your modifications.

If you don't have the in-house talent or software to modify the piece, or you plan on extensive modification, we suggest a printer or graphic artist. If you are going to go this route, please consider giving our benefactor Fred Fortune of Fortune<sup>2</sup> (read Fortune Squared) a chance to bid on the job. Fred's number is (408) 723-1202.
